

Using Colons, Dashes, and Parentheses

Punctuation marks are usually thought of as ways to separate ideas. However, some punctuation marks can be used to join facts, ideas, and other types of information. You can even use these punctuation marks to combine sentences. Colons, dashes, and parentheses are three of these types of marks. When one sentence merely names a series of items, consider using a colon to connect the series to another sentence.

Original:	I used several types of materials for my handmade brochure. They were paper, colored pens, glue, and pictures.
Combined:	I used the following materials for my handmade brochure: paper, colored pens, glue, and pictures.

Using a colon to combine sentences can help you make a dramatic statement.

Original:	I was certain of only one thing. I wanted it to look professional.
Combined:	I was certain of only one thing: I wanted it to look professional.

Dashes and parentheses can add variety to your writing. They can help vary your tone, changing your voice or that of a character. A dash can allow you to insert a whole idea, even a whole sentence, right into the middle of another sentence.

Original:	My photograph showed a sandy beach and palm trees. It was the most perfect beach in the world!
Combined:	My photograph showed a sandy beach—the most perfect beach in the world!—and palm trees.

A dash can also mean namely, that is, or in other words.

Original:	Visitors come to the island mainly for three reasons. They want to relax, fish, and swim.
Combined:	Visitors come to the island mainly for three reasons—relaxing, fishing, and swimming.



With parentheses, you can include interesting information that might not be of major importance.

Original:	Actually, my mother gave me some ideas. She's a travel agent
Combined:	Actually, my mother (she's a travel agent) gave me some ideas.
